## Roundtable Review Message from our CEO

Greetings,

September is National Suicide Prevention Awareness Month. Many of us have been touched by the loss of a loved one and have been left wondering "how did we miss

this?". Suicide is a formidable foe. We all know loved ones and acquaintances who are suffering silently with a smile on their faces. According to the CDC, before the pandemic suicide was the second leading cause of death among youth ages 10-24, and has been increasing ever since 2007, with a 60% increase between 2007 and 2018. The CDC reported in recent years, that the pandemic and the national discourse regarding race relations, and gender equality have exacerbated mental health challenges amongst our youth. CDC data indicated in 2021, 37% of high school students reported they experienced poor mental health and 44% reported they persistently felt sad or hopeless during the past year. Lesbian, gay, and bisexual youth and females reported greater levels of mental or emotional abuse by a caregiver, or contemplated suicide, than their counterparts. Further, over a third (36%) of students said they experienced racism, with the highest levels amongst Asian students (64%) and Black students and students of multi-races (both 55%). We must be vigilant in recognizing individuals who may be at risk. Some of the warning signs of suicide include sleeplessness or insomnia, eating too much or too little, showing signs of despair, mood swings, acting agitated or aggressive, avoiding people and spending more time than usual alone, behaving recklessly, talking about feeling hopeless and having no reason to live or looking for ways to harm himself or herself.

There are some things we can do to support individuals at risk for suicide. Be a caring adult. After all, that is what Kids at Hope is all about. Ask questions. Wrap the person in love, understanding, and support. Listen. Check-in. Provide resources, such as 211 or 988, the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. Connect the youth with professional help. We can be part of the solution to ensure our children remain "Kids at Hope". Our youth and families need us more than ever. Be there.

# A PART OF THE CAMPUS

The Roundtable's community partners started the school year off with a bang! Many have answered the call to participate in the Tunnels of Hope at various schools throughout the district. The back to school tunnels were held the first two weeks of school. The Kids at Hope Team and the Roundtable would like to thank everyone who participated in the Tunnels of Hope reaching over 5,000 students and numerous staff.



The St. Lucie County Sheriff's Office sent representation to every Tunnel of Hope. Lieutenant Keith Pearson, who serves as the supervisor for the School Resource Division at the Sheriff's Office shared his perspective on the importance and impact of the Tunnels on both students and School Resource Deputies (SRDs). He shared that the core beliefs of Kids at Hope align with the approach his staff is taking in schools. His deputies have the opportunity each day to engage with and impact 40,000+ students in St. Lucie County. The Tunnels at the start of the school year open the door for sixty SRDs to give a smile and word of encouragement to each student, which Kids at Hope refers to as a "moment of truth".

Lt. Pearson stated that SRDs seek to positively impact the students in St. Lucie County from Kindergarten through 12<sup>th</sup> grade and dismantle the largely existing "us vs. them" paradigm. Deputies are in schools to not only protect, but to build a bridge of trust between students and law enforcement. During the Tunnels, students often approached their SRDs with a hug, fist bump, or a huge smile, which was indicative of the positive relationships that have been successfully established. Several SRDs were attentive to the needs of their students by silencing the Tunnels for those who have sensory issues, or by escorting apprehensive students through the Tunnel to provide encouragement and reassurance.

Lt. Pearson also shared that the Tunnels of Hope are creating an opportunity for change in how the community views law enforcement. Many SRDs are an "Ace", i.e., a caring adult, for students at their respective schools. According to Lt. Pearson, "SRDs are on-site to be protectors, not enforcers. They are not just *on* campus, but a *part* of the campus."

The Tunnels of Hope provide a great opportunity for "Treasure Hunters" in our community to show their support and encouragement to all of the phenomenal students of St. Lucie County. We believe all children are capable of success, NO EXCEPTIONS!

Social Norm Campaign – Drug Free St. Lucie supports upcoming activities for teens and tweens at the St. Lucie County Public Libraries and provided 1,000 *Friday Night, Done Right* bookmarks to be placed in the teens and tweens check-out books.

Youth attitudes and behaviors are highly influ-

enced by what they perceive their peers' attitudes and behaviors to be. Those misperceptions can lead youth to conform to risky behaviors, such as drinking or drug use, because they believe that is the norm. Correcting this misperception allows youth to act in a way that aligns with their own beliefs, which most often involves positive behaviors.

*Friday Night, Done Right* is a prevention strategy aimed to correct the misperception, and dispel the myths about substance use being the norm among peers. The campaign focuses on having fun without substance use. It empowers teens by giving them positive messages and the ability to make important choices about how they spend not only their Friday nights, but other time as well. It also reinforces to those teens who are already spending their Friday nights without alcohol and drugs that it is normal, and they don't need alcohol and other substances to have a good time.

The library system already has events and social activities that give teens a healthy and safe environment where they can have fun, and consequently Drug Free St. Lucie sees this as a great partnership opportunity to deliver the *Friday Night, Done Right* Campaign message.
