Message from our CEO

Greetings,

March is National Social Work Month. Many of you reading this article are engaged in social work in some form. I applaud you. It requires us to work tirelessly to address the unmet needs of individuals, families, groups, commu-



nities, and society with the hope of improving the well-being of others individually and collectively. It can be thankless, yet rewarding work; however, we continue in this labor of love for others. The common chord I find with many colleagues and friends who engage in this work is that we have experienced trauma or disenfranchisement firsthand and are inspired to take a stand for others. Exciting news! St. Lucie County is on its way to building a trauma-informed care community. The Roundtable through our new Mental Health Collaborative "St. Lucie RISE", has joined forces with Tykes and Teens and Children's Services Council in a partnership to launch Peace 4 St. Lucie, a trauma informed community-wide initiative. The Trauma Informed Community Building (TICB) model, developed by the BRIDGE Housing Corporation is a holistic approach to community engagement that recognizes the impacts of community trauma on residents' lives. According to the BRIDGE Housing Corporation, "The outcomes of TICB go beyond traditional community building; they support the long-term health and well-being of a community by influencing the institutions that can support community improvements and meet community needs into the future." In the 40+ years of my career in social work, this approach resonates with me. As a child who was impacted by community trauma, a youth engaged in activism, and a professional with a career that has spanned across workforce development, welfare and criminal justice reform, prevention of child exploitation and sexual violence, mental health, and substance misuse prevention, it was clear that at the root of the despair of the people I encountered was and is trauma. As our

community embraces and institutionalizes Trauma Informed Care throughout our institutions, it will be a game-changer for all of us and the communities we serve. YLSL members will receive mentoring and guidance on the important local issues that they have identified and targeted for change, including understanding the legislation behind these issues, and how best to advocate and create a plan of action to address the issues. This partnership intends to mobilize Youth Leadership St. Lucie's efforts to raise awareness and subsequently encourage real change around the issues impacting their community. Our youth intend to be a part of the solutions to the challenges facing St. Lucie County youth today.

Youth Leadership St. Lucie members also volunteered this month at the "Treasure Coast Night to Shine", a prom night experience for people with special needs ages 14 and up. Cultivating Inclusive Mental Wellness For Women



In celebration of International Women's Day (IWD) on March 8th, the St. Lucie RISE Mental Health Collaborative would be remiss in not discussing the importance of caring for one's mental well-being. Equally, it is significant to acknowledge the hardship many women experience in this space. In many cases, women are the nurturing pillars of strength to others; thus, it is especially imperative to highlight mental health support when needed.

Addressing the Silent Struggle

In their lifetime, nearly twice as many women than men will be diagnosed with depression.¹ Although that is not a mental health diagnosis exclusive to women, certain types of depression are. Hormonal changes, while not singularly responsible for depressive episodes in women, are associated with an increased risk of depression.² As a result, the prevalence and need for resources for women is vast, so an affiliated solution must be implemented.

This year's theme for IWD is "Inspire Inclusion", so in our trek to promote mental health, it is imperative to embrace inclusivity while considering diverse experiences. One of the ways that our network commits to inspiring and uplifting women is with the inclusion of a sub-network workgroup concentrating on maternal mental health. In partnership with Kids at Hope's School & Community Liaison, Amanda DeMan, the *Mothers at Hope* initiative was launched in February with an initial gathering of key stakeholders in the community. The goal of *Mothers at Hope* is to *provide free, high-quality, and culturally appropriate Kids at Hope-themed peer support to new mothers through facilitated support groups*. Additionally, it is especially significant to provide information on the resources available to mothers in St. Lucie County.

Destigmatizing Mental Health Through Conversation

Peer support groups allow participants to feel comfortable talking about topics that may be deemed taboo elsewhere. With *Mothers at Hope*, a safe space will be created to foster productive and healing conversations. In turn, mothers will be destigmatizing mental health and becoming beacons of well-being that their children can emulate.

Building Stakeholder Capacity In Addressing Substance Misuse Prevention in St. Lucie County

With the continued support of the Opioid Response Network (ORN), Drug Free St. Lucie successfully hosted another virtual training on Monday February 19th, 9:30am – 11:00am, "Toxic Stress, Teens Brains, and Building Resilience", with trainer Gary White, National Consultant, ORN.

With forty-five (45) in attendance, participants gained knowledge in the following areas:

- Recognizing factors that influence toxic teen stress
- ♦ Identifying helpful ways when responding to teen stress
- Drafting a customized plan that builds wellness resiliency



Some of the agencies represented included: New Horizons of the Treasure Coast, Guardian ad Litem, Florida Department of Juvenile Justice, Florida Department of Health-St. Lucie County, Tykes and Teens, Families of the Treasure Coast, Helping People Succeed, Communities Connected for Kids, and Remember for Change.

Two Emerging Drugs Alerts!

Tianeptine - AKA: "Gas Station Heroin"

Tianeptine is available in various forms, from flavored elixir shots to capsules, powders, and even as counterfeit pills designed to resemble hydrocodone and oxycodone. Products containing tianeptine are readily available in gas stations, convenience stores, and online, often under the names of ZaZa, Tiana, Neptune's Fix, and Pegasus. Despite lacking approval for any medical use in the U.S., tianeptine is falsely marketed for a variety of conditions, including as a dietary supplement, as a smart drug to enhance cognition, or to manage opioid cravings.



The drug acts as an antidepressant and in high doses produces euphoria. Toxicity can lead to sedation, respiratory depression, coma, overdose, and death. The number of severe illnesses and poison control cases stemming from exposure to tianeptine has increased dramatically. In the U.S., only 11 poison control cases involving tianeptine occurred between 2000 and 2013. However, in 2020, this number skyrocketed to 151 cases. More recently, a spike in severe illnesses from tianeptine products occurred in New Jersey. All of these patients presented with altered mental status and the majority were admitted to an intensive care unit (ICU).

Analysis of products labeled as ZaZa and Neptune Fix revealed the presence of additional substances including kava, synthetic cannabinoids, THC, and CBD. An investigation of 90 blood samples from deceased individuals between 2018 and 2023 uncovered a common combination of tianeptine with ethanol, kava, gabapentin, and fentanyl.

Tianeptine is not currently scheduled under the Controlled Substances Act, federally; however, several states have acted including Florida. Recently, Florida Attorney General Ashley Moody filed an emergency rule categorizing tianeptine as a Schedule 1 substance.

Injectable Liquid Fentanyl

Reports involving the theft or diversion of injectable fentanyl solutions from healthcare facilities in the U.S. signal a potential exacerbation of the existing fentanyl crisis. Additionally, law enforcement agencies have seized bulk quantities of illicitly manufactured fentanyl (IMF) in liquid form from Arizona and Kentucky. These liquid solutions pose similar dangers as counterfeit pills and powders as they may contain lethal doses and dealers may mix adulterants such as xylazine, cocaine, and other fentanyl analogs into the solution.

Diversion of injectable liquid fentanyl from pharmaceutical sources has also been detected in countries where IMF has not yet emerged, including Nigeria, Colombia, El Salvador, Honduras, Argentina, Brazil, and Costa Rica. This situation is extremely concerning as such diversion could introduce fentanyl into drug markets that are not accustomed to illicit opioid use.

11th Annual—National Prevention Summit

Drug Free St. Lucie's Project Coordinator, Jovil Wharton, attended the 11th Annual National Prevention Summit in St. Petersburg, Florida, February 19th-20th, 2024. The Summit was cohosted by Drug Free America Foundation Inc. (DFAF) and Hillsborough County's Anti-Drug Alliance (HCADA).

With a focus on implementing successful prevention strategies, the goal of the summit was to heighten awareness about the devastating impact of drugs, reduce access, reshape social norms, and foster crucial discussions on prevailing policies. New to the summit this year were several sessions focused on reducing marijuana use during pregnancy and postpartum. In addition, as was held in previous years, there was a half-day session dedicated to Florida coalitions and partners working in community-level prevention.
