

Celebrating Autism Awareness Month

April is **National Autism Awareness Month**, and we're shining a spotlight on Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) to promote understanding, empathy, and support for individuals on the autism spectrum in St. Lucie County. While we recognize the importance of supporting individuals with a range of mental health diagnoses and developmental differences, this month's observance allows us to focus on raising awareness of ASD and encouraging our community to embrace neurodiversity. ASD affects 1 in 36 children in the U.S.¹, and we can all play a role in fostering a more compassionate community.

What is Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD)

ASD is a developmental disorder that affects communication, behavior, and how individuals perceive and interact with the world. Autism exists on a spectrum, meaning the experiences, strengths, and challenges of individuals with autism vary widely. This month, let's move beyond awareness and focus on building more connected, engaged, and nurturing environments.

Mental Health Tips

Supporting the mental and emotional well-being of individuals with developmental differences benefits the entire community. Here are some sensory-friendly strategies to create safe, supportive spaces:

- Design a Calm Space: Offer a quiet, low-stimulation area where someone can decompress when feeling overwhelmed.
- Use Visual Supports: Tools like visual schedules, picture charts, or symbol cards can ease anxiety and enhance communication.
- Encourage Breaks: Simple sensory breaks, like stretching, deep breathing, or quiet time, help regulate emotions and reduce stress.
